- Family trust and participation in schools
- Overall school climate

What School Counselors Can Do



Promote a Sense of Safety and Stability at School

- Collaborate with school staff to ensure school is a welcoming and safe environment
- Educate staff about how fear and uncertainty may affect student behavior
- [Provide crisis response resources as needed](#)



Provide Direct Student Support

- Provide individual and small-group support for students experiencing stress, anxiety, grief or fear related to instability
- Validate emotional responses
- [Teach learning strategies, self-management skills and social skills](#)
- Monitor learning, attendance and behaviors



Use Data to Demonstrate Educational Impact

- [Track trends in achievement, attendance and discipline](#)
- Share patterns with education partners to inform decision-making



Understand School and District Protocols

- Request clear protocols for staff response to inquiries or visits from immigration enforcement
- Elevate concerns through established school or district channels
