

The purpose of the Emerging Scholars Program is threefold:

- Assist Emerging Scholars to advance their scholarship, understand the culture of academia and build community with others in a similar place in their career, including those who have been practicing school counselors and are seeking academic positions as school counselor educators.
- Improve research quality in the school counseling field, including developing proficient reviewers for and future scholars likely to publish in *Professional School Counseling*.
- Assist in diversifying the researcher and academic pipeline in the school counseling profession.



Emerging Scholars participate in a two- to three-year cohort (January 2026 – Summer 2028), developing and growing their scholarship and research interests, learning about academia, and engaging in reviewing select *Professional School Counseling* manuscripts. At the conclusion of this cohort, Scholars have the opportunity to apply to publish a manuscript in a special issue of *Professional School Counseling*, highlighting their unique and innovative scholarship through engaging in the peer-review process.
